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A NEW YEAR MESSAGE FROM MRS COX, HEADTEACHER

Dear Parents, Carers and Families,

A very warm welcome back to the start of our new term, and a Happy New Year to you all. I hope that this newsletter finds you all well, and that your Christmas was enjoyable and restful, whatever it held. It has been really lovely to welcome the children back into school this week, excited by their new virtues and finding out what the term ahead holds. In my opening worship for the term, we looked at the VIRTUES of the term - 'Love of Neighbour' and 'Self-Control' - and talked about what they mean to us in our daily lives. We watched the Christmas Day speech from King Charles, who talked about how we can all 'cast our light' on people and communities around us through our actions, which really helped us to set our MISSION for the term, following in Jesus' footsteps.

Today we mark our Feast of Epiphany; it is twelve days since Christmas Day and is also known as Twelfth Night. This celebration in our Catholic calendar marks the end of the Christmas period. It is the day that the Three Wise Men, sometimes referred to as 'Magi', travelled to Bethlehem to see the newly born Jesus Christ, and is traditionally the day that Christmas decorations are taken down. Epiphany means 'manifestation' or 'an illuminating discovery, realisation, or disclosure' - what a discovery the Three Wise Men made when they saw the newborn baby Jesus, and recognised him as the Son of God! We know that the Three Wise Men took some very special and significant gifts to the new baby. Myrrh signifies death and mourning and was burned and used to prepare a body for burial; the Three Wise Men knew that one day, Jesus would die for us all. Frankincense symbolises holiness and righteousness and was burned during ceremonies to worship a deity. The inclusion of frankincense as a gift for Jesus confirms that the Three Wise Men understood that one day Jesus would save his people by dying for them. Gold was also given as a gift to the newborn king: gold is associated with royalty, and this was to acknowledge that Jesus was the King of Kings; born to die for us all.

We took our Year 4, 5 and 6 children to attend Mass along with other parishioners at our Catholic church of St Mary and St Augustine on Broad Street this morning to celebrate with a special Epiphany Mass with Canon Peter. All of the children were fantastic ambassadors for our school, and thank you to the children who took part in the readings for Mass. Thanks too, to Mrs Kazcmarek, who has created a lovely Epiphany display in the entrance to the school.

There have been lots of exciting visitors in school this week. Tom Baptiste, the new Director of Chaplaincy for the OLOL trust came to see me to discuss some exciting plans for St. Augustine's. We talked about new prayer spaces in school, a whole school mission project led by our pupils, the possible rebranding of the school mission statement and logo this year and a community hub! We've also been visited by three of our school Governors, who have met with their link priority leaders to review progress in their subjects following our Ofsted inspection. It was lovely to welcome them in school - some of our pupils even recognised Tom from his Youth Diocese weekly videos and thought he was a famous superstar!

WE REMEMBER POPE BENEDICT XVI: 1927 - 2022



"The world offers you comfort. But you were not made for comfort. You were made for greatness."

- Pope Benedict XVI

Pope Benedict XVI, born as Joseph Ratzinger in Germany in 1927, was one of the most influential Catholic theologians and leaders in the 20th and 21st centuries. In his youth he experienced the rise to power of Adolf Hitler that led to World War II. When the war was over, Joseph joined his brother Georg in the seminary and they were both ordained as priests in 1951. Ratzinger was an excellent theologian and earned a spot as a professor during the 1950s and 60s. He served as a theological consultant during the Second Vatican Council and grew in prominence as a theological expert within the Church in the years that followed. In 1977 he was appointed as an archbishop in Germany, and in 1981 the Pope assigned him to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith in Rome. Over the next 24 years he became one of the best-known and influential cardinals in the world. When Pope John Paul II died in 2005, Benedict XVI was elected as the pope at the age of 78. He took the name Benedict XVI in honor of the previous pope by that name and the monk Saint Benedict of Nursia. Pope Benedict XVI continued his teachings of the Catholic Church through his speeches and encyclicals during his tenure as pope. In February 2013, owing to his declining health due to old age, he shocked the world and made history by becoming the first pope to retire since 1294. All other popes in the modern age have held the position from election until death. Pope Francis was elected to take his place and Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI retired in a monastery in Vatican City, becoming the longest-living person to be pope.

Pope Benedict XVI died on 31st December 2022 and was laid to rest in the underground chambers of the Vatican in a private ceremony on Thursday 5th January 2023. As many as 100,000 mourners gathered in St Peter's Square ahead of the burial for the two-hour Requiem Mass given by Pope Francis - a historic moment as it is the first time in 200 years that a pope has led the funeral of another. During the three days leading up to his funeral, almost 200,000 people paid their respects and filed past Benedict's body dressed in a mitre and red vestments, his hands wrapped in a rosary, which was placed on a bier in St. Peter's Basilica without any papal regalia.
