THE SOLEMNITY OF THE EPIPHANY 6TH JANUARY 2024

Today is the 12th Day of Christmas, also known as Twelfth Night or Epiphany Eve.

Tomorrow we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany! This special day celebrates the coming of the Magi – the three wise men (or kings) from the East who followed a star and came to adore Jesus.

The definition of the word "epiphany" is a divine or supernatural manifestation – just as the wise men discovered Jesus.

There are many special ways all around the world to celebrate the Epiphany. In some countries, children open presents on the Epiphany instead of Christmas. Some people believe the Magi bring the presents instead of Santa Claus. Christmas decorations can be taken down on the Epiphany but some people choose to wait until Candlemas – the Presentation of the Lord. The Epiphany reminds us of how special Jesus is and that we should spend our lives seeking Him. Jesus is the light for everyone, and if we follow Him we will never go astray.

A MESSAGE FROM CANON PETER

In his church newsletter last week, Canon Peter answered the question 'Why do we call Mary our Blessed Mother?'

"In Sacred Scripture, after the angel Gabriel visits Mary in her home to tell her that she will bear the Saviour of the world at the Annunciation, Mary visits her cousin Elizabeth, who calls Mary "the mother of my Lord" (Luke 1:43). The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that because Mary is

the mother of Jesus—and Jesus is God made man—she has the beautiful privilege of being called "the Mother of God." She is not just the mother of His human nature; she is the mother of the whole person of Christ, and Christ has two natures: human and divine. The Catechism explains:

"In fact, the One whom [Mary] conceived as man by the Holy Spirit, who truly became her son according to the flesh, was none other than the Father's eternal Son, the second person of the Holy Trinity. Hence the Church confesses that Mary is truly the 'Mother of God' (Theo-tokos)" (CCC 495).

And we call Mary our Mother too, even though she is not our biological mother, as Mary gave birth to Jesus, who is the Head of the Mystical Body of Christ, and we are all members of His Body. She therefore brought us spiritually into being as sons and daughters of God. This fundamental truth is also why we have high regard for Mary. Before she said "yes" to God, we were not able to enter heaven. Her role in salvation history is crucial. Mothers guide, nurture, and teach their children. The Blessed Mother guides, nurtures, and teaches us to become faithful followers of her Son, Jesus Christ. As we honour the Holy Family this weekend and celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God this coming Monday, let us honour our Blessed Mother for her yes to God, and for giving us our Saviour, Jesus Christ."
