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A MESSAGE FROM MRS COX

Lent. What does Lent mean to us? We often associate it with the 'big headlines' of the liturgical season, like pancake day, ashes on our foreheads and looking forward to the coming together of Easter celebrations – and all of the chocolate and new life that comes with it. Some of you might give things up for Lent, an opportunity to stop eating something you've been meaning to cut out, or maybe make other sacrifices of time or energy in helping others. Or you may not think about Lent at all, as it's not something that you feel any need to mark, especially if you don't follow a Christian faith.

And yet, I'd wager we all 'do Lent' a little in our own way, even without realising it. The three main words that Christians focus on are prayer, fasting and almsgiving, so let's look at each in turn.

Fasting - We often talk to the children in school about fasting as following in Jesus' footsteps, during his 40 days and nights spent in the desert, as a way of avoiding temptation. A way of reminding ourselves of the sacrifice that Jesus made for us on the cross – but can we really liken avoiding sweets to dying for others? Probably not. That said, when the 'yummy cupboard' is calling with your cuppa in front of the TV, that moment when we stop ourselves from leaping up can make is focus on the thoughts and feelings we encounter when we don't give in so quickly to what we really want. This physical 'detox' can also lead to a spiritual one too, bringing about a sense of self-control and for some of us, make us think a little deeper about what sacrifice means, which helps us to participate in a small way, in the cross and burden of Christ's sacrifice.

Almsgiving – charitable giving is an ancient practice that was around long before Jesus; I'd argue it's human nature to help others as we all try to live in community with one another. We certainly teach our children to be charitable through our virtues and 'Faith in Action' projects throughout the year. However, this Lenten call to almsgiving means making the needs of other people our own. One of the central lessons of the cross is compassion; I bet each and every one of us carries someone else's burden, worrying about them, finding ways to help them, not just with material objects but often with our time and emotional support. All of these things, done for others at the sacrifice of yourselves, help to purify your body, mind and spirit and bring you closer to Christ's image.

Prayer – our amazing Director of Chaplaincy, Tom Baptist, led our headteacher community in prayer this week; he's a really inspirational man who can make some of the more unfathomable aspects of Catholicism feel relevant and achievable.



When talking about prayer, he said that it's important to give ourselves time and space for this, not to worry about any special words and that even if the words don't come at all, God knows what's in our hearts. So in times of difficulty, when we're upset, when our hearts leap with joy – God knows and accepts this as prayers, of asking, of healing, of thanks. Try to recognise the thoughts and feelings in our hearts throughout Lent, and offer them up to God in thanks of His ultimate love for us.

Finally, a big thank you to each and every one of our community for your constant almsgiving to our school – your kind words, time, energies, donations and the help you give to your children at home with their learning, all make such a difference to our daily lives in school. I hope you all know how much we appreciate our St. Augustine's community. Have a happy Lenten weekend; I hope that you recognise Jesus in all of the things you do for yourselves, your family and your community.

THE TRANSFIGURATION OF JESUS SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT 25TH FEBRUARY 2024

Jesus took Peter, James, and John up onto a mountain to pray. The disciples watched in awe as Jesus transfigured (changed appearance) before them. His face shone radiantly like the sun and his clothes became as white as the bright light. Astoundingly, Jesus was joined by Moses and Elijah, who had both died long before. A cloud engulfed them all, and the voice of the Lord affirmed that this is his Son and they should listen to Him.

This image was far from anything that Peter, James, and John had ever witnessed before. It showed them that Jesus truly was from God.

Prior to this transfiguration event, Peter had confessed that Jesus was the son of the Living God; the transfiguration proved this to be true in the most wondrous way. Moses and Elijah would have been two of the greatest Jews that had ever lived, and Jesus standing with them showed their importance.

Moses received the Law and brought it to the people, and his face also glowed, after he had spent time with God.

> Elijah is referred to as a messenger of the Lord preparing the way. Even before the Transfiguration occurred, Jesus said that John the Baptist was like Elijah. John prepared the way for the coming of Jesus by preaching repentance and softening the hearts of the people. His thoughts on Jesus, Jewish law, and the relationship between God and Jesus evolved into the foundation for the development of Christianity.

Thank you to Mayor Croft, Ms Wheeler and Ms Díaz-Muñoz for such an interesting visit, the children really enjoyed it.












ART POP-UP




GREEN TEAM
