#### A MESSAGE FROM MRS COX

This week has been nothing short of amazing in school – we have had so many important things happening, with lots of visitors. Everyone in school has been feeling pretty tired today. But that hasn't stopped us! We have also welcomed in Spring with some lovely sunny days.

On Monday and Tuesday we had local and national news crews around school, recording interviews and footage to support the Benedict Blythe Foundation's newly released report on allergies. The absolute superstar was Holly from Acacia class who, without warning or preparation, spoke confidently and eloquently about her allergy to 'everything under the sea' and how we all help her to stay safe. On Monday, we were also notified of our Catholic Schools Inspection. We had 48h notice before two inspectors arrived on Wednesday for a two day inspection into our Catholic Life and Mission, RE and Collective Worship Provision. We were very pleased to be able to showcase all the wonderful things we do in school that make us so special and I'd like to send my sincere thanks for everyone's amazing support, positivity, questionnaires, comments and interviews. We will give you more information once the report is finalised, but for now, it was such a joy to see our whole community pull together – parents, pupils, governors and staff – to show the inspectors what a great Catholic school and community we really are!

If that wasn't enough for one week, we've also held an Inspire+ 'Legacy Tour' assembly, welcoming Bluecoat School pupils into school to pass on the Olympic torch, then taking it to Malcolm Sargent School to pass onto them. On Thursday, Miss Bush and Mr Sinclair took 7 girls to play in the Stamford Junior School girls netball tournament. After only a couple of training sessions together, we finished fourth overall out of seven schools, and the girls had great fun. The thing I'm most proud of though, is that I was contacted by a parent of another school after the event, who sent the following message:

'More compliments for St. Augustine's...out of all the teams, they were the team that showed the best sportsmanship and [my daughter] loved playing against them. They clapped when [our team] scored and complimented them for intercepts. How lovely.'

#### BENEDICT BLYTHE FOUNDATION

On Monday, we had the great privilege of meeting Helen Blythe, mother of Benedict Blythe, as she was interviewed by the BBC at our school.

Benedict died in 2021 during a very normal day at the school he attended. Benedict collapsed with anaphylaxis; he was just five years old. Benedict was allergic to milk, along with many other foods including soy, sesame, eggs and nuts.

Helen and her husband, Pete, have created a foundation in memory of their beautiful boy, Benedict, and the joy that he brought to them and his sister, Etta.



# Big Lent Walk!



# Green Team

Last week, our Green Team children took part in The Big Plastic Count, an initiative founded by Greenpeace and Everyday Plastic. Our Green Team children counted plastic over the course of seven days, and submitted their findings to the national survey for analysis. This information will be collated along with all data received nationally to show the government they need to get serious about tackling the plastic waste crisis.

Imagine the volume of plastic being created globally, over years and years. That's why we need the governments across the world to agree to a Global Plastic Treaty which cuts plastic production. This would mean less plastic litter in our parks and green spaces, fewer incinerators polluting our air, and less of our waste being dumped abroad

We collected plastic from home over 7 days and sent our finding to The Big Plastic Count. They analysed our data and these are the results they sent to us.

Hard plastic is a lot easier to recycle than soft plastic. While hard plastic is recyclable. there are still man items that are less likely to be recycled, such as soap bottle pumps, polystyrene chips and toothpaste tubes

Just 12% of local councils in the UK collect soft plastic, like plastic bags, and wrappers. Do you know if yours collects it?
