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A MESSAGE FROM MRS COX

This week is the 4th week of 'Eastertide' in the Catholic church. Easter begins on Easter Sunday, which celebrates Jesus rising from the dead and the celebration of Eastertide, sometimes called Eastertime or Paschaltide, lasts for a total of 50 days - longer than the 40 days of Lenten reflection. This period ends with the Feast of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit came down upon the apostles, Mary and the first followers of Christ to encourage them to go and spread the Word of God among the Nations. This year, the Feast of Pentecost falls on Sunday 19th May. If you have popped into school recently, you may have noticed that our prayer spaces are no longer purple, but are now white and gold; colours which reflect the joy and hope of this lovely season. This is a time often called 'the most important of all liturgical times' as it celebrates God's greatest act of love to save us; days above all others in which the 'Alleluia' is sung.

We have been celebrating World Earth Day in school this week and our Laudato Si team have worked hard with Mrs T to plan a fabulous day filled with activities focussed on saving and protecting our wonderful world and home – planet Earth. Following the morning assembly in which the children heard Pope Francis' call to action, all classes took part in a range of activities including sorting different types of recycling and lots of arts and crafts with recycled items to be displayed around school. The day ended with a fabulous 'fashion show', where members of each class showed the outfits they had designed using only recycled materials – I was asked to be the judge and found it very hard to choose a winning class as I was blown away by the creativity and imagination shown in each design. Well done everyone!

Years 1, 2 and 3 visited our church on Tuesday, attending Mass to celebrate St. George's day followed by activities in the church hall. Parents, please do come along and join us in church, and for the activities afterwards on these occasions, as it's lovely to have you with us. Canon Peter was so very welcoming and delivered a great homily, explaining to the children the symbolism of St. George slaying the dragon and protecting the princess, also showing the virtues of determination, resilience and courage.

Finally, the week has ended with the second week of swimming for our Year 1 and 3 children, who have all been grouped and behaved beautifully at the pool today. Mrs Garland attended the sessions and reported with such joy on the happy, determined faces of the children, giving it their all and having a super time!

SAINT FIDELIS OF SIGMARINGEN

FEAST DAY 24 APRIL

Fidelis, born in 1577 at Sigmaringen, Prussia, was a man of many names. Mark Roy was his baptismal name, Fidelis his religious name, and 'Poor Man's Lawyer' his nickname. Mark Roy was known for his generosity throughout his life.

After receiving his doctorate in philosophy and law, Mark Roy tutored young boys from noble families, but his heart was with those who were poor. He established himself as a lawyer and only took cases that upheld the cause of those who were poor and oppressed. Inspired to search for a deeper, more committed life of serving God, Mark decided to enter the Franciscans. He distributed his wealth among people in need and made religious vows, and was soon chosen as superior.

Now going by the name Fidelis, he was guardian of the monastery, when an epidemic broke out in the city. Fidelis opened up the friary to care for those who were sick and he cured many soldiers staying there. In 1608, Protestantism swept through Switzerland, and because Fidelis was a good preacher, he was sent by the Propagation of the Faith to bring the Swiss people back to unity with the Church of Rome. People claimed his best results came from the hours he spent in prayer late at night. It was a dangerous mission.

The people in revolt against the Catholic Church hated anyone connected with it. But Fidelis put his life in the hands of God. At Seewis in 1622, a gun was fired at him as he preached, but he escaped unharmed.

Later, however, he was martyred by opponents in Seewis.

Internet Matters have released their latest Digital Wellbeing Index report showing that teen girls experience significantly more negative outcomes online than other children.

The report goes onto quite a lot of good detail, but some key takeaways are:


- · The online world is vital for social connection and social media encourages creativity.
- · Harassment of girls has become normalised for some parents and girls. This harassment includes hateful comments, bullying and inappropriate messages/images from men
- · Although social media can be positive and encourage creativity, it is also a source of sadness and social pressure, including being worried about their body shape or size.
