A MESSAGE FROM CANON PETER

In last week's parish newsletter, Canon Peter wrote about the Gospel and the Homily:

The Liturgy of the Word reaches a climactic moment in the proclamation of the Gospel. There are unique rituals and prayers surrounding this proclamation:

- The people stand to hear the Gospel, unlike the previous readings.
- We sing 'Alleluia' in praise of what we are about to hear, Jesus Himself speaking to us in the Gospel.
 The priest bows before the altar to pray that God might cleanse his heart and lips that he may be worthy to proclaim the Gospel.
- The priest and people trace the sign of the cross over their forehead, lips and breast (the priest also traces it on the Gospel text itself) praying that they may understand what is proclaimed, profess it in their lives by what they say, and that it may find a home in their hearts. Making the sign of the cross over the text and ourselves reminds us we are hearing, and called to witness to, the saving truth of Jesus Himself.
- Incense may also be used to incense the Gospel: incense is used to show that the divine is present as we hear the words of Christ, God made man, Himself.
 - After the proclamation of the Gospel, the priest prays secretly that 'through the words of the Gospel may our sins be wiped away'.

The Gospel reading receives extra attention in the Mass because Jesus is the centre of all Scripture, and the Gospels are our principal source for the life and teachings of Christ.

The word 'homily' means 'explanation' in Greek. It is used to describe the priest's explanation of and expounding upon the biblical texts proclaimed at Mass.

This practice has roots not only in the early Church, but also in the Scriptures themselves: so that the word of God was understood properly, the Levites in Nehemiah (8: 5-8) not only read from the Book of the Law (the Scriptures), they also 'gave the sense' so that the people could understand the readings. Justin Martyr, writing in the 2nd century (around the year 155), describing the gathering of Christians on Sundays for the Eucharist comments that 'When the reader has finished, the president of the assembly speaks to us; he urges everyone to imitate the examples of virtue we have heard in the readings.'

Jesus' own ministry also reflects this practice as we see in Mark 1:21 where Jesus taught in the synagogues (he did not just read the Scriptures there), and in Luke 4:18-30 where He explains the meaning of the prophecy, its meaning and application.

So, at Mass the Scriptures are explained by one who participates in the authority Jesus gave to the apostles and their successors to teach (Matthew 10:1-8, 40), were all hence the Church reserves

ministers alone.

How Boys are being Led to Misogyny

It will come as no surprise that social media is the avenue by which most people see misogynistic and other harmful content. In February 2024 a new report called 'Safer Scrolling' was released by Dr. Kaitlyn Regehr from University College London which contains useful, important data for schools and colleges on how boys are being targeted with misogynistic content, how social media companies are promoting that content and what teachers can do about it.

As part of the study it is shown that after only 5 days of TikTok usage there is a fourfold increase in the levels of misogynistic videos shown to teenage boys in their TikTok ForYou timeline.
