The first full week back at school has been a busy one in every classroom, with so much exciting learning happening across the school already. We've also been very excited to welcome our new EYFS pupils to the school, who have all settled in brilliantly and are already showing Miss Darby and the early years team how beautifully they can behave, get along, play and learn together – we're so proud of you all! Our classrooms feel very full this year, with new children joining us all the time – we've already had three new pupils join us this week, with another application today. It's so heart-warming to know that our community are recognising all of the great things we're doing here in school and that our pupils are happy and thriving; we are privileged to be chosen as the school of choice for so many families and hope to continue to grow and fill.

In the spirit of welcoming new members to our St. Augustine's family, we hosted our first weekly coffee morning today in Shiloh. Mrs Garland, Mrs Reeves and myself enjoyed tea and biscuits with current parents and visitors, in the warm and welcoming wellbeing room, Shiloh, until 9.30am. We really value the opportunity to broaden our pupils access to wider curriculum activities, and feel proud of the clubs that we offer over the course of the year. I'd like to let you know that we have made the decision to return to the ClassDojo app from next week, to record your child's virtue points. We try very hard to keep the number of apps that we use to a minimum, as we know that it can be confusing, however the newly updated features in ClassDojo mean that not only will it be easier to track and monitor the point totals each week ready for Celebration Assembly, but will also allow the children to be more engaged in their points as they can see their avatar on screen and their totals rising with each point awarded. Please do sign up when invited by your child's class teacher, so that you can talk with your child each time they earn a virtue point, celebrating their successes at home.

Finally, I'd like to thank you for your overwhelming support with our new uniform – the children have come back looking amazing and I am so proud of how smartly they are representing our school. I hope you all have a lovely weekend and look forward to seeing you on Monday.

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#### HOLY COMMUNION

In his parish newsletter last week, Canon Peter wrote:

Throughout the Mass we express our need to be healed spiritually as we prepare ourselves to encounter God in Word and Sacrament. In a final preparation for receiving Our Lord in the Eucharist, we acknowledge our unworthiness for this great gift and ask Him to forgive our venial sins and heal our souls: 'Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof but only say the word and my soul shall be healed'.

We echo the faith and humility of the centurion who came to Jesus, asking for his servant to be healed (Matthew 8:5-10). He believed that Jesus could heal, and he recognised his unworthiness to have Jesus under the roof of his house. What Jesus offered to do for the centurion is similar to what he does for those who receive him in Holy Communion. In Matthew 8, Jesus offers to go to the centurion's house to bring healing there. At Mass, Jesus lovingly comes to us in the Eucharist to bring healing to our souls and fill us with his life. We should imitate the centurion by approaching the reception of Holy Communion with the same reverence and humility that he exhibited when he approached Jesus, recognising it is a great privilege to have Jesus 'under our roof', to be called to this intimate union with Our Lord: something we should never take for granted

Receiving Jesus 'under our roof', one whose very Eucharistic body enters into ours in the most intimate way possible, means though that we should at the very least be in a state of grace to receive Him.

Anyone conscious of grave sin should receive the Sacrament of Confession before coming to Holy Communion.

St Paul himself urges us then to examine our conscience: 
'Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of profaning the body and blood of the Lord. 
Let a man examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup 
For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body 
eats and drinks judgement upon himself'

(1 Corinthians 11:27-29).

### WHAT ARE PEGI RATINGS?

PEGI age ratings are used to ensure that video games, are clearly labelled with a minimum age recommendation based on their content. They are designed to help parents and carers make an informed decision on the games their children play



The PEGI rating considers the age suitability of a game, not the level of difficulty.

Games are suitable for everyone



Games may contain mild violence and scenes or sounds that younger children may find scary.



Non-realistic violence against human characters is allowed. Sexual innuendo and mild swearing is also allowed under this rating.



Realistic violence is allowed at this rating, and more extreme bad language. The use of tobacco, alcohol and illegal drugs is also allowed to be present in games.



The adult classification is used when games have extreme and graphic depictions of violence. They can also show illegal drug use and explicit sexual activity
