A MESSAGE FROM MRS COX

I'd like to start by thanking you all for your patience regarding the situation with our heating and electricity. You may have noticed that over the October half term, we had solar panels installed, which are gradually being connected to the National Grid main power source, hence the disruption on the local streets. These solar panels, once live, will power our new air source heating – all of which will make powering and heating the school more cost-effective and, most importantly, will be much better for the environment! However, there have been some delays in getting things connected up properly, which has left us using fan heaters in school. The system, I'm promised, will 'go live' on Wednesday 20th November, so until then, if your child is feeling chilly in school, please feel free to send them in layers and/or PE kits, even on days when they don't have PE, so that they can stay warm and cosy!

Huge thanks to Mrs Garland for running the parent consultation on the sex and relationship aspect of our taught PSHE curriculum, the The Conversation Stamford for joining her to answer questions – and of course, to the parents who came along. As a Catholic school, we do so much in terms of character education, nurturing the whole child and teaching them ways to be the best citizen that they can be. We were very proud therefore, to be recognised this week for our inclusivity in football – Chris Graves from Inspire+ popped in to present us with an Inclusive award from the FA, recognising that our pupils' access to football across age groups and genders, both in and out of the classroom, is excellent for all! Well done to Miss B who continues to work very hard to offer a great sports provision here at St. A's, and to our new Family Support Worker, Mrs Smith, who has been working on improving our playtime and lunchtime provision even further.

This weekend is Remembrance Sunday and many of our former pupils will be on parade on Broad Street as part of the CCF. On Monday, Mrs Donington and I will be taking a group of younger pupils to Broad Street to lay a wreath made by the children, observe the 2 minute silence and join other children in singing a Remembrance song – please feel free to

meet us down there. In school, Mrs Wright, our Lay Chaplain, will be leading a Remembrance Liturgy along with the chaplaincy team and all are welcome. Jesus showed us that 'Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends' (John 15:13) and we recognise the huge sacrifice our war heroes made and continue to make for our freedom, across the world.

I wish you all a peaceful and reflective Remembrance weekend, whatever you are doing – I may see some of you in Mass as we join together in thanks and prayer for those who 'gave their tomorrows for our today.'

'DO THIS IN MEMORY OF ME'

These words of Christ at the Last Supper were more than a simple command to commemorate. They are a call to awakening that in this life this important historical figure, Jesus of Nazareth, has left his mark on the world. As we come to the altar to follow this command the effects of that first Good Friday are not only called to mind, but are brought to effect having a direct bearing on our lives.

Our memory forms us, it has a impact on who we are as individuals and as a society. The Early Church Fathers spoke of the memory as being 'a power of the soul'; the great philosopher, Aristotle referred to it as being the 'scribe of the soul', such is its effect. Memory informs, rightly or wrongly, and impacts our decision making and therefore our future. It also keeps the events of the past effective in our lives.

This Month of the Holy Souls is a particular time where we recall with an act of memory those who have gone before us from this life and have left their mark, directly or indirectly. It is good that we should have a season of the year for remembrance a time when we feel that that veil between time and eternity is thin, and we can sense that a greater and wider communion of saints to which we belong. The Church has settled this feast on a time in the turning of the year when the pre-Christian Celtic religions were accustomed to think of and make offerings for the dead. The Church kept the day, but it changed the custom.

The greatest and only offering, to redeem both living and dead, has already been made by Christ, and if we want to celebrate our loving connection on both sides of the veil, we need only now to make gifts for and to the living.

Today we especially 'remember' those who have given their lives through war in service of our country. They have left home and family often to foreign lands in the search of justice, freedom and peace; the effects of which we feel in our society today. The world could have been a very different place for us without their sacrifice, which cannot and should not be forgotten.

E-SAFETY WITH ALAN MCKENZIE ATTENDANCE

Report - "I've Seen Horrible Things."

On the 29th October the Children's Commissioner released their latest report titled. "I've seen horrible things": Children's experiences of the online world. This is a follow-on report from The Big Ambition report which received 253,000 responses from children and adults. At 59 pages it's quite a big report so here's a very brief summary:

- 71% of respondents say they feel safe online. However, some children as young as five and children with special education needs and disabilities disproportionately report they feel unsafe.
- Girls were less likely to agree that they felt safe online relative to boys (67% vs 75%).
- · There is a correlation that children who state they feel safe online is linked with children feeling good about other areas of their lives.
 - o This is interesting as it allows us to question what offline vulnerabilities may lead to a higher likelihood of online harm?
- Children do not feel in control of their online lives, e.g. phone addiction and algorithmic content influence.
- The prevalence of online CSA is a big concern for many, as is evolving technology and risks such as AI.

There's a lot more to the report, with much taken up by statements from children and young people themselves, which allows us to get into the allimportant 'why?" question. For example, my own experience shows that very few young people have a good grasp of how algorithms are used to feed content to someone's timeline or For You page, how this can lead to echo chambers and, most importantly of all, what they can do about it. So whilst the report concentrates on the fact that the government needs implement the Online Safety Act quicker, it can also be really useful for us on the front line as it gives us the very questions and concerns that children and young people are raising themselves.

Being around teachers and friends in a school environment is the best way for pupils to learn and reach their potential. Time in school also keeps children safe and provides access to extracurricular opportunities and pastoral care.


MEET OUR CHAIR OF GOVERNORS, JULIE MCBREARTY


