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### A MESSAGE FROM MRS COX

GU

Thanks again for your support regarding the ongoing difficulties we've had with our heating system – National Grid are working over the weekend to try and ensure things are powered up and warm by the end of play on Tuesday. The added complication of a cold snap hasn't helped and I'm grateful to everyone – staff, pupils and parents – for the lengths you have gone to in helping this week to run as smoothly as possible!

I would like to take this opportunity to clarify some of our staffing in school. For a small school, we have lots of staff – far over and above what we are funded for by the DfE. This is in part due to support from our Trust – we have a very experienced team of teachers, which has been essential in doing work to develop the curriculum, as many of our staff lead at least two subjects and often more, which is no easy task! Teachers and teaching assistants wear lots of hats, and we all work together to ensure our children have the best education - all decisions are made through extensive team discussions and utilise staff strengths and expertise, based in current evidence and guidance.

#### Teacher release time:

Every teacher is entitled to PPA – Planning, Preparation and Assessment – which is non-contact time away from the classroom. Schools are able to decide the best way to facilitate this provision and at St. Augustine's classes are covered by subject specialists.

As part of extra responsibilities such as the Deputy Headteacher (DHT) role or subject leader, teachers are given extra time away from class to undertake management responsibilities including work on school development priorities and activities such as monitoring.

**Juniper Class** – Mrs Oliver is an acting DHT this year and is released every Wednesday by class teacher, Mrs Hamlin who has been providing cover and release in school for the last 3 years.

Sycamore Class – Mrs Donington is an acting DHT this year and is released every Wednesday by class teacher, Miss S who teaches in Acacia class on Mondays and Tuesdays. After Christmas, Miss Lee will return from maternity leave and provide this release day for Mrs Donington for the rest of the year.

#### Specialist teaching:

Every week, the children have lessons delivered by specialist members of staff, overseen and quality assured by myself, my subject leaders and in some cases, external agencies. These are:

**Modern Foreign Languages** – Miss Hawkins, one of our teaching assistants delivers French each week to Key Stage 2 classes. Miss Hawkins is French herself and has (cont'd on next page...)



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lots of experience of delivering French lessons and clubs, having also taught English in French schools. Miss S is the subject leader for French and they work together to ensure we follow the 'Kapow' curriculum scheme, that the subject is well delivered and that the pupils are making good progress. Miss Hawkins is extremely enthusiastic about this role in school and has lots of plans for developing French further across the whole school in the future – this is also great preparation for secondary school!

**PE and Games** – Miss Bush has been with us for the last 3 years as a sports apprentice and is about to finish her Level 4 sports coaching apprenticeship. Miss Bush has been mentored and monitoring by Inspire+ who provide sporting provision throughout Lincolnshire, and as PE lead myself, I work closely with Miss Bush to ensure our PE and sporting offer is top notch! Miss Bush delivers two PE lessons a week (other than those who are receiving Woodland School sessions) to every class in school and also leads all sports teams and attends fixtures.

**Computing** – Mrs Taylor delivers computing lessons each week and manages the technology in school. Mrs Taylor is a highly experienced cover supervisor, with years of experience teaching whole classes across the school. Miss S oversees Computing as subject leader, but Mrs Taylor has been delivering our curriculum in computing for the last 3 years and has an excellent grasp of the planning, software, knowledge and skills throughout school.

**Music** – As part of the Our Lady of Lourdes CMAT, I spend several thousand pounds a year buying into the OLoL music scheme, which affords us a day a week of specialist music teaching from Mrs Pattison. In line with DfE requirements, all classes have access to an hour of curriculum music, delivered by Mrs Pattison, with additional opportunities through singing assemblies, visiting performers, concerts, trips and choir. Mrs Pattison also provides peripatetic music lessons privately, again through OLOL music, on a range of different instruments – contact the school office for more information if you are interested in booking.

#### Shared teaching:

Some of our subjects are taught by a range of teachers and teaching assistants beyond their normal classroom as a streamed or split-year group model. All of our staff are well-prepared, trained and overseen by the class teacher and subject leader to ensure high quality input, outcomes and relationships for all pupils. These are:

**Phonics** – Miss Darby is the phonics lead and trains a large team of phonics specialists, both teachers and teaching assistants, in line with the Read Write Inc. phonics model, as approved by the DfE. Children are regularly assessed and split into small teaching groups, which change every 6 weeks. This allows for extremely tailored and targeted teaching every day, in small groups, which ensures rapid progress for all and excellent results year on year. Miss Darby liaises with, trains, prepares and monitors phonics every week to ensure it is delivered to a very high standard.

**Maths** – All class teachers are in charge of maths for the children they teach and are accountable for their progress; Mrs Worrick oversees the whole school picture as maths lead. In many classrooms, the input is delivered by the class teacher and then often, teaching assistants are used to support small groups, both in and out of the classroom, with targeted learning. In classrooms with two year groups (Sycamore and Acacia), we feel that single year group planning and teaching provides a better curriculum for children rather than following mixed-age planning in the same class. In this instance, Mrs Taylor (Years 1 and 2), Mrs Garland and Mrs Kaczmarek (Years 3 and 4) support the class teachers with delivery. The class teachers rotate regularly to ensure they are closely involved and know their pupils' progress and needs at all times.

As ever, as the professionals in charge of your children's education, both personal and academic, every decision made in school has the children's best interests at heart and make the best use of the staff and resources available. If you have any further questions about our approach, please see your child's class teacher in the first instance.

#### THE FOUR LAST THINGS - HELL In last week's parish newsletter, Canon Peter wrote:

"From his heart of love, God the Holy Trinity seeks 'to communicate the glory of the blessed life' (Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) 257). Out of the perfection of his love, God creates, redeems and heals what is fallen away, and sanctifies, purifying all that he is drawing to himself to share in his life. We must always remember that, as made clear in the First Letter of St. Paul to Timothy, 'God our Saviour desires all men to be saved' (1 Tim 2:3). God's only desire is for our salvation.

Hell is the ultimate self-exclusion from this drawing motion of Love, the final refusal of 'communion with God and the blessed' (CCC 1033).

God, in whose image we have been created in, is the fullness of Being and calls us back to communion in Him. Hell is therefore a self-destructive choice—to be less than one might be, to find a parody of life in the small world of one's own making, a world from which God, our Creator, is excluded and, because of this, the person is demeaned, spiritual joy is denied, and selfless love is replaced by selfishness and abuse. Rather than participate in the reality of God's creation, hell is the state where one continues to seek to 'be like God', but 'without God, before God, and not in accordance with God (CCC 398, quoting St. Maximus

the Confessor). It is the eternal loss of the vision of God and final alienation from Him.

> As with heaven, we are reminded of the life here on earth which can lead to such a final destiny and of the need for a radical conversion of life each time we become aware of the seeds and shoots beginning to grow in that destructive direction. Hell exists for those whose wilful choices mean they freely persist in sin and lack repentance before the end of their lives leading to their damnation. The teaching of Christ and His Church is therefore a reminder of the incredible gift of freedom and of the importance of using our freedom wisely, well, and one with God's grace."

#### **Roblox Tightens Safety Measures**

Roblox, one of the most popular games around the world, has been under a lot of fire lately for a whole host of reasons, such as highly inappropriate games accessible to young children, questionable moderation, significant grooming concerns and more.

At its most basic, Roblox is a platform where any user can create games and one of the biggest concerns is that none of these user-generated games have required an age rating system. That's about to change, from mid-December creators will have to content-rate their games. Whilst a positive step it still raises lots of questions, such as:

- Is anyone checking these ratings?
- What about games prior to mid-December?
- Will there be enhanced moderation?
- and more.
