THE JUBILEE YEAR 2025; A MESSAGE FROM A ST. AUGUSTINE'S C.V.A GOVERNOR

The Jubilee Year 2025, the Year of Hope, will be a very special and significant year for all those involved with St Augustine's Catholic School Stamford. Pope Francis has asked us all to grow in our friendship, relationship and love of God. From 24th December 2024 until 6th January 2026, we are all asked to rebuild and re-establish our life of prayer, service to other and follow a life of virtue, especially *HOPE*. Mrs Cox and her team will create countless opportunities through: RE, Collective Worship, and the entire school ethos to embrace this very special year. We can start this week by discussing in our homes the symbols you see in the Jubilee logo; perhaps, as you pray together as a family, you can say the Jubilee prayer on the last page of this newsletter.

What is a Jubilee?

The Catholic Church Bishops' Conference of England and Wales explains the meaning and significance of the Jubilee: "The Jubilee Year is a time to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation.

"Jubilee" is the name given to a particular year; the name comes from the instrument used to mark its launch. In this case, the instrument in question is the yobel, the ram's horn, used to proclaim the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur). This (Jewish) holiday occurs every year, but it takes on special significance when it marks the beginning of a Jubilee year.

We can find an early indication of it in the Bible: a Jubilee year was to be marked every 50 years, since this would be an "extra" year, one which would happen every seven weeks of seven years, i.e., every 49 years (cf. Leviticus 25:8-13). Even though it wasn't easy to organise, it was intended to be marked as a time to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation, and involved the forgiveness of debts, the return of misappropriated land, and a fallow period for the fields.

Quoting the prophet Isaiah, the Gospel of Luke describes Jesus' mission in this way:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord," (Luke 4:18-19; cf. Isaiah 61:1-2).

Jesus lives out these words in his daily life, in his encounters with others and in his relationships, all of which bring about liberation and conversion.

In 1300, Pope Boniface VIII called the first Jubilee, also known as a "Holy Year," since it is a time in which God's holiness transforms us. The frequency of Holy Years has changed over time: at first, they were celebrated every 100 years; later, in 1343 Pope Clement VI reduced the gap

between Jubilees to every 50 years, and in 1470 Pope Paul II made it every 25 years. There have also been "extraordinary" Holy Years: for example, in 1933 Pope Pius XI chose to commemorate the 1900th anniversary of the Redemption, and in 2015 Pope Francis proclaimed the Year of Mercy as an extraordinary jubilee. The way in which Jubilee Years are marked has also changed through the centuries: originally the Holy Year consisted of a pilgrimage to the Roman Basilicas of St. Peter and St. Paul, later other signs were added, such as the Holy Door. By participating in the Holy Year, one is granted a plenary indulgence."

THE EPIPHANY

In last week's parish newsletter, Canon Peter wrote:

'An "epiphany" is an appearance. In this weekend's readings, with their rising stars, splendorous lights, and mysteries revealed, the face of the child born on Christmas day appears.

Herod, in the Gospel, asks the chief priests and scribes where the Messiah is to be born. The answer Matthew puts on their lips says much more, combining two strands of Old Testament promise—one revealing the Messiah to be from the line of David (cf. 2 Samuel 2:5), the other predicting "a ruler of Israel" who will "shepherd his flock" and whose "greatness shall reach to the ends of the earth" (cf. Micah 5:1–3).

Those promises of Israel's king ruling the nations resound also in the Psalm. The psalm celebrates David's son, Solomon. His kingdom, we sing, will stretch "to the bounds of the earth," and the world's kings will pay him homage. That's the scene too in the First Reading, as nations stream from the East, bearing "gold and frankincense" for Israel's king.

The Magi's pilgrimage in the Gospel then marks the fulfilment of God's promises. The Magi, probably Persian astrologers, are following the star that Balaam predicted would rise along with the ruler's staff over the house of Jacob (cf. Numbers 24:17).

Laden with gold and spices, their journey evokes those made to Solomon by the Queen of Sheba and the kings of the earth". Interestingly, the only other places where frankincense and myrrh are mentioned together are in songs about Solomon (cf. Song of Songs 3:6; 4:6, 14). One greater than Solomon is here though: He has come to reveal and solve as St Boul in his Epistle together.

His manifestation forces us to choose: will we follow the signs that lead to Him as the wise Magi did? Or will we be like those priests and scribes who let God's words of promise become dead letters on an ancient page?




